WIRAB 2022 Initiatives



- <u>Initiative 1:</u> Advise WECC to improve regional coordination and information sharing to mitigate risks associated with wildfires and the impacts on and from the bulk electric system in the Western Interconnection.
- <u>Initiative 2:</u> Advise WECC to conduct a reliability assessment, identifying the services and capabilities that long-duration energy storage could provide to support ongoing system reliability in the Western Interconnection.

WIRAB 2022 Initiatives



- <u>Initiative 3:</u> Advise WECC to produce a preliminary summary of gridforming inverter technology and its potential to support the stable operation of the Western Interconnection.
- <u>Initiative 4:</u> Advise WECC to continue to improve its "Western Assessment of Resource Adequacy" and to complement this planning work with additional education and outreach on how resource adequacy problems impact real-time system operations.

2022 Budget Overview and Assessment



- WIRAB's proposed 2022 Budget is \$918,900; a \$286,600 (23.8%) decrease from WIRAB's 2021 budget.
- WIRAB's proposed 2022 Assessment is \$698,700; a decrease of \$287,600 from 2021.
- WIRAB's proposed FTE's for 2022 is 3.0; a decrease of 1.75 from 2021.


WIRAB Assessment Stabilization



- WIRAB projects its working capital reserve will be \$908,400 on December 31, 2021.
- WIRAB's desired working capital reserve for December 31, 2022 is \$689,200; 75% of WIRAB's proposed 2022 budget.
- WIRAB's goal is to target a working capital reserve equal to 20% of budgeted expenses beginning in 2026.

WIRAB supports streamlining technical committee governance
 processes under the direction and oversight of the Joint Guidance
 Committee (JGC) to remove unnecessary burdens and allow more
 time for subject matter experts to focus on the timely delivery of
 meaningful work products.

 WIRAB supports the JGC taking a stronger managerial role in supporting and ensuring alignment between WECC technical committee work plans and the organization's reliability risk priorities.



 WIRAB supports merging WECC's Operating Committee (OC) and Market Interface Committee (MIC) into a single Reliability Risk
 Committee (RRC), thereby creating a new stakeholder engagement structure that will bring stakeholder experts together in an effort to comprehensively analyze emerging reliability and security risks and produce meaningful work products in a timely manner.



- WIRAB is concerned that the current RAC and proposed RRC voting provisions create an opportunity for important work products to be rejected at the eleventh hour by committee members not engaged in the consideration, development, and refinement of those work products.
 - WIRAB proposes that the JGC document instances where committee work products fail to reach the simple majority threshold, report any concerns with the proposed voting provisions to the Board, and address any such concerns prior to WECC's next 4.9 Review.



• <u>Overall Comments:</u> WIRAB Staff recommends that WIRAB support the effort and advise WECC that it is important to streamline governance so that technical subject matter experts can focus on completing meaningful work products in a timely manner, creating a virtuous cycle that improves WECC's stakeholder engagement process.
